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Equipped for Christ in Nursing

Someone I spoke to recently commented that "there is a trend of being pushed into a 'system'... be it Kaizen or Toyota, you either develop a passion for such systems or you discipline yourself to and follow it. Either way, it is a prescribed method and ideology of how things should work, or how you should think...."

Who determines the daily work of our hands or the pleasures and goals in our life? Dead lines, the outbreak of antibiotic resistant bacteria, the organization's vision and mission, crisis relief to disaster stricken countries, paper chase, demands from our families, our church involvement?

Some of us are on top of things, some of us under the pressure, and some just going with the flow. Some of us have grown closer to God in dependence on Him, some of us have grown further in dependence on self and some are in denial in our relation with God. Which category do you fall into?

For me, I'm busy juggling between my Bible College assignments, projects in SNCF, spending time with NYP students and the recent batch of RN's in the hospitals and church activities. I pause and ask myself, "what in the world is happening to Nurses and Nursing?" Where does God appear in all these? Are we the influencers (salt and light) whom God has sent out into the world or are we the influenced?

I am reminded of the conversation between Elisha and his servant in 2 Kings 6: 15-17 where Elisha's servant could only see the army of the king of Aram surrounding the city. Elisha prayed for his servant's eyes be opened to see the hills full of horses and chariots of fire all around Elisha. Are our eyes open to both the physical and the spiritual? Are we like the men of Issachar (1 Chron 12:32) who understood the times and knew what to they should do? **Do we see that God has placed each and everyone of us strategically where ever we are in this season to do great exploits for Him as Esther (Es 4:14) did? Are we doing battle on our own or are we watching over each other's life?**

This first newsletter for this year brings in the theme, "Equipped for Christ in Nursing" from Eph 4: 11-16. This is a three part series where we **Relook** at nurses and nursing, **Refocus** and **Realign** our lives to God, and **Rise** up and accept the Responsibilities for our designated positions in the Kingdom of God. The questions posed were meant to help us think and reflect on who we are in Christ as much as what we have been doing recently or even the past few months or years.

Editor's Point of View

In the process of being equipped for Christ in nursing, we need to be very careful lest we get stuck in this whole system thinking of "doing". The purpose of gifts was to "train Christians in skilled servant work, working within Christ's body, the church, until we're all moving rhythmically and easily with each other, efficient and graceful in response to God's Son, full mature adults, fully developed within and without, fully alive like Christ (Ephesians 4: 11-13, The Message Bible). The theme "Equipped for Christ in Nursing" is set in the context of the Book of Ephesians chapter 4 after Paul the writer reminded the believers their position in Christ in chapter 1,2 and 3. If we forget or are not clear about our position in Christ, how could we see ourselves as being equipped for Christ? Not just individually but corporately.

NCF does not exist to get nurses primarily to do work, whatever form that may take. Otherwise nurses may feel "used" when doing committee work or projects. If we focus on the being, it will result in the doing, the doing that pleases God. Why am I a nurse? What does it mean to be a Christian nurse? Why NCF?

NCF International, playing the role of equipper, has been organizing conferences (regionally and internationally) to equip nurses to relate faith to profession. In 2003 and 2005, PACEA NCF region organized leadership training for staff and leaders. Of course, equipping is more than just conference or leadership training. It involves an ongoing dialogical process among Christian nurses, locally and internationally.

Let us not put the cart before the horse. Let us feed and nurture the horse and the cart will move.

Creating Space for God to Act and Speak

PACEA Staff/Leaders Training (7-9 March 2005, Malaysia)

20 nurses, comprising of Staff and Leaders from PACEA NCF region, gathered together from 7- 9 March 2005 at Gotong Raya, Genting, West Malaysia for the PACEA Staff/Leaders Training. Three nurses from Indonesia NCF (Perwankin) joined the meeting for the first time. The number of participants was double of the number of the last training held in Hong Kong March 2003.

Members from the region came to share their NCF unique experiences as well as their personal stories. Through their enriched lives, I see the hands of God molding and preparing them for His purpose. Though this was not the first NCF Staff/Leaders Training that I attended, this meeting, however, was one in which I felt most ministered and encouraged personally and ministry wise.



Perhaps it was because of the lovely setting of the Mawar Apartment amidst the backdrop of the Malaysian mountains, the overwhelming hospitality of our Malaysian hostesses from Malaysian NCF and the marvelous programme put together by the PACEA Regional Committee. Maybe for the first time, pastoral care was rendered....and we felt so “valued” and “loved” not only by God but by NCF community of nurses.

Topics such as “Strategic roles of NCF” challenged us to come together to listen, reflect, share, forgive, celebrate and above all, pray for each other. The session on “Vision and Missions of NCF” helped participants to articulate the values we cherish in NCF such as: Unity in Diversity, Caring for each others, International Fellowship, Strong emphasis in Biblical Nursing . After some brainstorming, members affirmed the need for a Strong Leadership Programme,

Resource Development, Pioneering NCF ministry, and Strong Partnership among member countries as goals for PACEA NCF.

I confessed I went with mixed feelings of “Is there a ministry for NCF among nurses? Is NCF relevant or irrelevant in today context?” So what are some of the “goodies” that I can receive to convince me to continue in the ministry of SNCF? I need to hear from God and from the Christian community of nurses gathered together.

I came and left comforted that there is a ministry for NCF. When nurses are willing to come together before God, the presence of God is there, and His ministry begins.

As *Henri Nouwen said, “Solitude, community, and ministry are disciplines by which we create space for God. If we create space in which God can act and speak, something surprising will happen. You and I are called to these disciplines if we want to be disciples” By coming together in Malaysia, we were creating space for God to act and speak.

Snapshots of Kalimantan Project

In 2003 SNCF joined partnership with Girls Brigade and MIKA, a Christian humanitarian agency based in Jakarta, to set up a clinic in a Christian school, Ngabang Kalimantan. This region is underserved in terms of health services. Since setting up the clinic, NCF Pacific East Asia region has moved on to offer community health teaching focusing on primary health care.

Since 2003, 4 trips have been done and the project will continue till 2006. NCF PACEA had since invited NCF Indonesia to be partners. Teams had been blessed working together.

The focus of the community health teaching is health promotion and primary health care. Basic stuff on how to manage simple ailments to using herbs available in the community as well as on how to manage the environment were some of the topics taught.
